

# Give your students a **storehouse** of words to use when reading, writing, listening and speaking! A great and worthy mission!

Why? Vocabulary size is one of the strongest predictors of reading development and academic success.\*


The author, Janet Caruthers, Ed. S., was a teacher in Title 1 schools for over 25 years. It was there that she started a list of **foundational**, **everyday** words her students didn't know (but should have). She decided to do something about it, so she turned her list into a couple of books! Many of your students didn't learn these words in their homes either, creating a gap between the words they **should** know for reading success and the ones they actually **do** know. This book, along with the supporting resources, can help you fill in that gap. Each of your students will receive a dictionary to use at school, and then take home at the end of the school year.






#### Children love this book!

You can use it in literacy centers, as part of shared reading or refer to it during your read-alouds, as vocabulary instruction.






Janet included this in The Dictionary Toolkit and there is also a download on her website if you would prefer to print a copy. She thinks you will love it. Just project (or write) one of the 100 bellwork assignments on the board each morning. Students will copy and answer the questions by using their own Illustrated Dictionary. As they use multiple pages to answer the questions, they will be getting multiple exposure to the new words (essential to making the words their own). When you discuss later, you'll be building concepts, critical thinking and more. You and your students will have fun with this!
